After stating the purpose of the meeting the President appointed as a committee on resolutions,

W. K. Shafer presented the report of the committee on resolutions and after remarks by O. C. Bowers, W. K. Shafer, J. W. Mc Dowell, John W. Hoke, Geo. W. Atterton, W. S. Hoemer, J. G. Minchart, A. W. Gillow and Isaac Wright, the resolutions as presented were adopted.

Resolutions.

In the death of Daniel O. Gehl this community lost a citizen well known and prominent. Born in Chambersburg, he continued to make this his home until his death. His bright and sunny disposition won him many friends and endeared him to all who knew him. Mr. Gehl took a keen interest in all matters connected with the welfare of the town, and gave his assistance in every way possible. He was remarkable for his large circle of acquaintances and for the number of his friends, not only within the County, but elsewhere. Mr. Gehl's character was firm and consistent throughout. He never did a mean or dishonorable act. His treatment of everyone was courteous, kind and perfectly fair. These traits of character endeared him to all. He was active in the affairs of his Church, and did much for its well-being.

Mr. Gehl was admitted to the Franklin County Bar at an early age and at once began the practice of the law with his father, Hon. Hastings Gehl. All his legal work was conscientiously and carefully performed and his business judgment was good. In the work of the official position he held for some years prior to his death he was much interested and was exceedingly accurate. He was uniformly obliging and courteous toward his fellow members of the Bar. In the death of Mr. Gehl the members of this Association feel a distinct loss. Therefore be it resolved, that these resolutions be engrossed upon the minutes by the Secretary, and that copies thereof be furnished to the
