Minutes of a special meeting of the
Franklin County Bar Association held in the
courtroom of the Franklin County Courthouse,
Chambersburg, Penna., June 22, 1957, at 1:15 P.M.,
C. D. S. I.

The meeting was called to order by
President J. Glenn Benedict.

At the opening of the meeting the
President announced that the Association
had gathered together to consider a Resolu-
tion to be offered on the death of Charles W.
High. John McDowell Sharpe Sr. Chairman of
the Resolutions Committee then read the
Resolution, a copy of which is attached
hereto and made the adoption of the
Resolution.

The resolution was seconded by
N. F. Keller who commented on the fact
that he had known Mr. High for more
than forty years and that Mr. High
had been admitted to the Bar at the same
time as his first partner W. L. Maxick.
He further stated Mr. High was well
known for his fairness, even temperedness,
his activity in community affairs and
was widely respected because he never
spoke ill of any person". He also said


all the members of the legal profession.

A. J. White Sutton seconded the motion commenting that he was the oldest member of the Bar and had been practicing when Mr. High was admitted to practice. He said Mr. High represented one of the last of the old school lawyers trained in the office and that only three survived in Franklin County and that he was one who was willing to attest to the ability and knowledge of Charles W. High and regretted his passing.

John K. Lashley, Jr., seconded the motion saying the Bar Association has lost a good fair and honest lawyer. He further commented on Mr. High's remarkable ability to recall and describe the colorful history of the Franklin County Bar Association and the Franklin County Courts.

At this point the President announced he felt the entire Bar Association endorsed all of the foregoing sentiments and that the motion had been duly seconded. The motion was voted upon and adopted unanimously.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned and the members attended the funeral services conducted for Mr. High in a body.
